
BEDFORD - PAST AND PRESENT

VOLUNTEER PROFILE

KATHIE BEVAN

Why did you decide to volunteer at Scott Manor House/Fort Sackville Foundation and how long have you been volunteering?

I grew up in Bedford and knew of the Manor House since my childhood. At some point in time, it was purchased by the Fort Sackville Foundation and became a museum. I have been attending events at the Manor House since 2014 and also the meetings. Shortly after I became a member. The idea of learning more of the history of Bedford was intriguing to me, and it morphed into volunteering. I started volunteering after I retired in 2018.

What types of things have you done as a volunteer for SMS/FSF?



I have made the famous oatcakes for Tea Room and The Georgian Social. In 2019, I started working with the summer programming committee. Booking music venues and indoor display events. I would attend the music events to greet the musicians and make sure everything ran smoothly. I also greeted the groups who would be in the North Room with their displays, I helped set up their displays and helped break the displays down. I also completed the paperwork required for the use of the North Room for each Group.

I joined the History Group at the Manor House after receiving a call from Ann MacVicar in April 2022. I enjoy meeting with the group twice a month on Mondays. In 2020, I helped Terry Gordon & Valerie Ivy get ready for the Group of Seven art show for the Manor. We had to mount all the copies of the paintings on white board. Unfortunately, due to Covid the event was postponed, as the Museum did not open to the public for the 2020 season. Happily, in 2021, we set up the Group of Seven display and it ran for July & August in the North Room. I was at the Manor House for the two months rotating days with Terry Gordon, greeting guests and discussing the artists and their work with visitors to the display.

What are the best things about volunteering with FSF/SMS?

The best things about volunteering at the Manor House are meeting new people, seeing old friends and acquaintances, and making new friends. Learning the History of the House and the surrounding areas of Bedford and beyond. The books in the library Reading Room hold fascinating facts and stories. I especially love reading about history. I enjoy learning the wisdom of other History Group members. Hearing about the information they have researched and seeing & reading the end result of their research. The Monographs compiled by members, nonmembers or students holds a vast array of historical data. And we have some copies for sale.

NEW TO OUR COLLECTION

A recent addition to the Scott Manor House collection reminds us of the beauty and memories attached to everyday objects, like antique tableware, that are passed down in families. The Fort Sackville Foundation recently received a donation of dishes from Lloyd Mitchell, whose family settled in Bedford in the early 1800s. As a youth in the mid-1950s, Lloyd often helped his great aunt Lillian with chores at the original Mitchell family home where his grandfather Malcolm grew up in the 1880s. The house, no longer standing, was constructed in the 1830s on Mitchell Hill in the approximate location of today's 15 Meadowbrook Drive. Filled with antiques, the home was left to Lloyd's aunt



Lillian by her father Thomas Mitchell. Lloyd recalls seeing these beautiful blue and white semi-porcelain dishes displayed in his great aunt Lillian's china cabinet. As time went on, the dishes were carefully passed to other Mitchell family members, until they were last displayed in one of Lloyd and Lynda Mitchell's residences. Preservation by family members has meant that now others can enjoy the striking beauty of these dishes when they visit Scott Manor House this summer. The dishes will be catalogued (photographed and information details recorded) for inclusion in our Collections database, which can be accessed online at NovaMuse (novamuse.ca), a searchable database of Nova Scotia museums.


DID YOU KNOW?

This map of a section of the Village of Bedford in 1865 is part of the A.F. Church map collection. In 1864, Ambrose F. Church was commissioned by the Nova Scotia legislature to create a series of maps, one for each of Nova Scotia's 18 counties. Each shows the locations of towns and villages, basic topographic features and the names of residents. In many cases, the occupation of prominent townsfolk (clergy, blacksmith, merchant) is also included. Visit Scott Manor House to view its map collection.
