VOLUNTEER PROFILE: ROSLYN DUFFUS

1) Why did you decide to volunteer at Scott Manor House/Fort Sackville Foundation and how long have you been volunteering?

I've been involved peripherally since the time before the property was purchased by the Town of Bedford. My father, Allan Duffus, worked so very hard in an effort to bring the 2 sides to an agreement for the sale of the property. My mother, Carol and I supported him through this time which was often quite challenging. He continued to work to have the property listed as a place of Historic Interest in 1992 and served on the committee set up to manage the care of the building in the early days before the building became the centre of Bedford's History.



2) What types of things have you done as a volunteer with SMH/FSF?

My Father passed away in 1997 and from my records, it seems that I first started to volunteer in the garden in 1998 and at some point became

Chair of the Grounds Committee which I continued to do until about 2009. This involved soliciting for help from some of my gardening friends in the Bedford Horticultural Society and working with HRM, especially around the time that the new North Room (designed by my Brother Graeme) was built, requiring some re landscaping. One of the biggest efforts each year was to care for the raspberry patch at the back of the house. My mother often helped me with this chore. These berries were featured in the Tearoom in season but, with the deeper shade as the trees grew bigger, the patch ceased to produce a good crop. I continued to volunteer periodically with some hours given to weeding and also, to rebuild the cabinet that came out of the Teachery to be used as a secure display case for the Scott Manor House. I also built the Notice Board by the front door. I currently sit on the Board of Directors.

As a member of the Pipes and Drums of Clan Farquharson, I have also enjoyed playing at the Bedford Days Georgian Tea held at the Scott Manor every year since 2007.

3) What are the best things about volunteering with FSF/SMS?

As a young person, I was taught to appreciate our built history as well as the history of those that have gone before and continue this interest and enjoy learning more with people who have similar interests.



century ago by none other than Group of Seven artist A. Y. Jackson.

In an attempt to keep the painting here, art dealer Robert Manuge approached the Province of Nova Scotia to buy it but with no success. It went into a private collection in Upper Canada. Before selling the painting, Manuge contacted Elsie Tolson, asking her if she could identify the site. She could. In fact, she had put a photograph of it on page 214 of *The Colonel, the Captain and Me*.

Jackson had titled the painting "A Nova Scotia Village" -- being our very own Bedford. The scene shows the Richardson house on the left and the (later to be) Whitman building on the right. The current footpath between the two properties, leading to First Avenue, is shown as a dirt road, apparently wide enough to accommodate the horse and carriage approaching it. Dominating the painting is the Presbyterian Church on First Avenue, with its distinctive bell tower. The scene was all but unrecognizable well before Whitman's vanished; the Church (where Lew and June Turner were married) was demolished with the formation of the United Church in 1925.

Jackson created "A Nova Scotia Village" during a visit when he and Arthur Lismer painted together. Among the pedestrians shown on the street are Mrs. Lismer (Esther) and the only Lismer daughter (Marjorie) walking the family dog. (Lismer reciprocated by painting Jackson into at least one of his works.)


We included a reproduction of "A Nova Scotia Village" in our summer program art shows in 2017 and 2022. If you are wondering why I have wasted seven hundred of the thousand words that a painting is worth, instead of showing it to you, it is because we did not obtain permission to reuse in any form any of the reproduced works after the end of our shows. However, you can feast your eyes on archive material available at SMH. This includes a photograph of Elsie Tolson with the painting at the time of its sale. I would not be surprised if you also discover a color photo of "A Nova Scotia Village."

FROM THE STACKS OF THE RESOURCE AND RESEARCH LIBRARY AT SCOTT MANOR HOUSE

If you are researching your ancestors from Bedford, look no further. Family historians can find lots of great resources in the Scott Manor House Library. These include obituaries of individuals who lived in or were from Bedford, Canadian Census data for the Bedford area from 1871 to 1921, family files containing information on



various individuals who lived in the area, monographs compiled on the lives of various local families as well as some miliary records. You can also find local books such as "The Captain, the Colonel and Me" by Elsie C. Tolson and "The History of Bedford" by Tony Edwards that help fill out our knowledge of the kind of lives our ancestors lived. You may also be able to find photos from the time your ancestors lived in Bedford.

The Library at Scott Manor House also holds a variety of material related to the people, places and activities of Halifax County and Nova Scotia. Winter visitors are welcome to come and view the materials during our regular Research Group meeting times. We normally meet the first and third Mondays from 9:30 to 12:00. THE MACKENZIE HOUSE 6 FIRST AVE. BEDFORD: HERITAGE DESIGNATION UPDATE

We are very pleased to report that, on February 25th, the Halifax Regional Municipality voted unanimously to add the MacKenzie House, 6 First Avenue in Bedford, to its list of heritage properties. Thank you to Marc DeLuca and Jane Pritchard, current owners of the property, for valuing the historical significance of the building and investing their time and effort in the process. We also heard that Red Gables, the former home of the late Tony Edwards, 8 Sullivan's Hill, has received approval as a heritage property from HRM Council. It will be interesting to see what the new owners of the property will do there.

REPORT ON THE SANDY LAKE PRESENTATION

On February 20th, Scott Manor hosted a special presentation concerning Sandy Lake and the issues currently threatening this local gem of a park. Jillian Ramsay of the Ecology Action Centre provided maps and details of the boundaries and the areas buffering the park. She outlined the potential threat a proposed subdivision, that could accommodate up to 9,000 homes, would cause to the ecosystem and waterways of the lake and its tributaries. And, causing further concern, there could also be a new highway built to provide a transportation route for all of these new vehicles. She described how the areas surrounding the park are almost as important as the park itself for the protection of endangered wildlife and the survival of the local ecology.

Although most of the attendees knew of these recent developments, Jillian gave us important information and many left the meeting intending to write to our local government officials to let them know their concerns. 

A BEDFORD SOUVENIR FROM THE GOLDEN AGE OF POSTCARDS



A postcard craze, known as the Golden Age of Postcards, dates from about 1905 to 1915. Taking advantage of the popularity of postcards, Valentine and Sons Publishing Co. Ltd., based in Dundee, Scotland, opened offices first in Montreal (1903), later in Toronto, Winnipeg and Vancouver by 1912. They became the largest producer of souvenir postcards of communities, scenery and landscapes in Canada. Shown here is a

charming example of a classic Valentine & Sons postcard from the Fort Sackville Foundation (FSF) collection, looking up the Sackville River toward the arched iron bridge and Tolson's Woolen Mill with the old Fish Hatchery on the right. According to the FSF Heritage '80 photo database, the card dates c. 1905, noting "the image cannot be newer than 1907 because by 1907 this hatchery had been replaced by a fancier one."

The Valentine & Sons cards are marked on the front with a six digit number, followed by the encircled initials "J.V.", visible in this card's left bottom corner. The number on the card refers to an image number, not the card itself. The same image might be published for years, with different borders or in a moonlight version, all with the same number. In 1926, the company split into Valentine Black and Valentine Edy, publishing postcards until 1957 and 1960, respectively. Look
